Friday Club – We'd like to take this opportunity to remind you that Friday club is only for the children of those parents who are in work on a Friday afternoon and do not have access to any other childcare arrangements. We are consistently over-subscribed for places and we must ensure that they are being offered to those who have a genuine need. We expect children to attend regularly and not 'drop in and out', as this causes difficulties for planning, resourcing and staffing the sessions. We expect children to stay for the full club i.e. until **3.10pm**. We review attendance every term and will remove the offer of the space if it is appearing from the lack of attendance that other arrangements are available to the family. Thank your support with this.



Collection of pupils at the end of the day REMINDER - We'd like to take this opportunity to remind you that, if there are any changes in collection arrangements at the end of the day, you must let us know in writing. If it's a one-off, on the day change, a message in your child's contact book is fine or you can, of course, email the office who will pass the message on. It can be tricky for you to pass a message on to the teacher on duty in the morning as it's such a busy time, so a written note or message left with the office is always best.

If it's a more permanent arrangement i.e. a family member or close friend will be meeting your child regularly at the end of the day, please send in a letter or email, or call the office. We will need the person's name and a contact number for them.

Emergency contact numbers - It is essential that we have at least 2 emergency contacts for your child. If we currently only have 1, please log on to Arbor and update your records. If this is going to cause difficulties, please speak to a member of the Office Team.

This term, Falcon Class are reading **'The Silver Sword'** by **Ian Serraillier**. The book is based on true accounts of life during and after WWII in war-torn Poland.

Synopsis

"We must get away from here ... ".

The night the Nazis take their mother away, three children escape in a dangerous scramble across the rooftops of Warsaw, where they have to learn to survive on their own. Then the children meet Jan, a boy with a paperknife – the silver sword – that they recognise as belonging to their long-lost father. The sword becomes their symbol of hope as they begin the hazardous journey across war-torn Europe to find their parents. What we think about the book:

"I like the book because it is unpredictable and you can picture what is going on through the description." - Alwande








Battery Recycling – This week we have collected **152** batteries!! Fantastic total, thank you.

Year 4 Science Day - Yesterday, year 4 took part in their science day and took on the roles of scientists! The children got involved in a range of experiments, from exploring non-Newtonian fluids and making lava lamps, to experimenting with acids and alkalis.

The children were even able to explore how polymers work, by pushing pencils through bags of water without them leaking, and were able to make letters float off of plates and catch them with paper! There were two demonstrations in the afternoon, creating elephant's toothpaste, and even using fire to create a chemical snake! It was a fantastic day.





Year 5 Space talk - Last Friday, Year 5 had a visit from an actual rocket scientist! Dr James Beck has worked in the space industry for 20 years, first trying to land a probe on Mars (it crashed) and then trying to help with the space debris problem. Currently, he works on investigating how to burn bits of spacecraft in big wind tunnels to help people design things to burn up in re-entry rather than surviving and becoming a risk to people on the ground.

The children really enjoying learning all about the problem of space debris and what James and space agencies around the world are doing to solve the problem. Did you know that debris orbiting the planet travels at 17500 mph?

Remember, you don't need to be working in America to work in the field of space, James only lives 30 miles from here.

Lots of the children in Year 5 are now really interested in working somewhere in the field of space. What about you



Year 6 an afternoon spent in WW2 - Year 6 were lucky enough to have a visitor last week to talk to them about WW2. Mr Betts is a real WW2 enthusiast and had lots of artefacts and replicas he was happy to show us and let us handle. James Betts (who used to come to our school) came too and helped. They both came dressed as soldiers! Mr Betts talked about the different uniforms people wore and how they would be different in different countries. He also played an air raid siren which was really, really loud! We learnt about the role of women during the war and how people used Morse Code to communicate.

Did you know there was an army camp where the Howard School is now?

Lots of us tried on uniforms- some were really itchy! James also talked about what life is like at secondary school, gave us some top tips and answered lots of our questions about year 7. It was a really interesting afternoon and year 6 would like to say a big thank you to both of them for talking to us in their own time.
