



This year, Earth Day activities revolved around the Earthday.org theme of '*Planet vs Plastics*'. Through writing, art and D&T activities, our children have had the opportunity to develop their knowledge and understanding of the impact that single-use plastic and plastic waste has on our world and the need to find ways to live more sustainably.

They have, once again, demonstrated their commitment to making, not only our local community, but the wider world a better place and they understand that by making one small change and working together we can make a big difference. They speak passionately about how plastic is harmful to human and animal life – and how it contributes to climate change - and they not only suggest ways to protect our planet but they can act upon their ideas, too. Here are some examples of their amazing work, their thoughts, ideas and opinions ...

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Year R

For Earth Day Year R have been discussing the impact of plastic waste in our oceans. We will be doing lots more learning about this next term but this was a great opportunity to start talking about the damage that plastic waste can do to wildlife in our seas and on our shores.

The children have said that animals should not eat plastics and they can become very poorly. They know that they must remember to take their rubbish home, try to re-use plastic where they can and have pledged to share this message with other people.

The children had the opportunity to make sea creatures out of plastic over the Easter break and we are amazed by what they have produced, take a look below.

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Year 1

Year 1 have learned all about the damaging effects of plastic on our oceans and land. We all agreed that plastic is not good for the earth and its creatures. We found out that plastic doesn't disappear back into the earth like food rubbish would. Therefore, we decided that we must recycle it. We found lots of old plastic flower pots and plastic bottle and glue stick lids. We didn't want to put these in the bin. We decided to put them to good use by making a bee café. We have been learning all about bees and how important they are to the earth. We learned that they like to drink nectar from brightly coloured flowers. We got into groups to plan a bee café, using the plastic plant pots as a base and the plastic bottle lids as large cups holding sugar water to help any poorly or thirsty bees.

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Year 2



In Year 2 we started our week by having an assembly all about Earth Day. It was great to think about what we already do in school but also surprising to hear about all the little ways in which we can all make a huge difference! We have thought more in class about just how important it is to look after the environment, with a focus on the harmful impact of plastics. We watched some short videos which highlighted the dangers towards creatures and also showed a deep sea exploration to reveal just how much plastic was littering the bottom of the ocean floor.

The children decided they wanted to communicate their message to others by means of a poster. Their designs are a striking way of highlighting the dangers but also the positive changes that can be made. We love your creativity Year 2!

Furthermore, the children have been learning about plants and have all planted sunflower seeds in their own handmade recycled pots. Take a look at the photos of their plant pots all made from recycled newspaper! These pots can then be planted in the ground and will decompose without causing any harm to the soil or wildlife. The children followed some very tricky instructions to be able to do this.

In our English sessions the children have also been using noun phrases, adverbs and alliteration to create some beautiful poems about the dangers of plastics in our seas and oceans. They have used photographs and video clips to gather ideas which, combined with their passion and enthusiasm, have made some really powerful poems. What fabulous eco activities we have in Year 2!

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Year 3

This week Year 3 read *Somebody Swallowed Stanley* and *Somebody Crunched Colin* written by Sarah Roberts. They really enjoyed looking at what happens to the plastic if it is not recycled properly and ends up in the sea.

They investigated how this plastic affects the animals in the sea killing them, hurting them or ending up on our plate after they have eaten the plastic, then we eat the animals.

The children wrote their structured poem based on how the plastic damages the animals in the sea, and explained how animals are using plastic to survive. They used alliteration and created different verses.

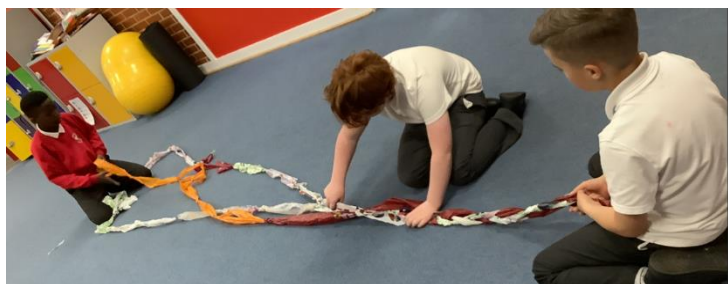


Artwork
